In Haggs Church we are approaching our celebrations of the 175<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the foundation of this place of worship and I feel that it is important that, just as we remember those who have fallen in war to give us our freedom, we remember all who have gone before us in this place and have passed on their faith in our Lord Jesus Christ. May our time of celebration be a time that we renew our mission to show the love of our Lord to our community and to pass on the faith to future generations.

#### 'We Will Remember Them'

2014 marks the centenary of the start of WW1 on 4<sup>th</sup> August 1914. Many programmes on the television and radio have tried to capture the horrors of war, but a visit to Belgium in August of this year really made history come to life for me.

The villages around Ypres were small agricultural communities until they were abruptly set on the world map from 1915-1917. Between 1915 and 1917 the British had tried dozens of times to force their way through the high positioned German defences on Messines ridge only to get bogged down in the mud and forced back by a constant bombardment of shells along with mustard gas.

Life in the trenches was appalling. It has been estimated that up to one third of Allied casualties on the Western Front were actually sustained in the trenches. Apart from enemy injuries, disease wrought a heavy toll.

The 'Flanders Offensive' in 1917 was seen as a way of breaking the stalemate and to capture the ruins of the village on the top of the ridge – Passchendaele. However, after 100 days the allies had advanced hardly eight kilometres and the human toll was enormous – 250,000 British killed, injured or missing, a quarter of the troops deployed, with German losses just a bit lower.

Scotland had a population of nearly four million in 1914. 560,000 Of its men served in uniform and 148,000 died. The death rate of 26% was the highest of the major participating countries; it's devastating consequences affected every Scottish village for the rest of the century. Over 80 names of men from local families, who lost their lives during WW1, are recorded on the Longcroft Memorial.

The Tyne Cot Cemetery at Passchendaele is the largest Commonwealth War Graves Cemetery in the world. Between 1919

and 1921 specialist units brought almost 12,000 dead to Tyne Cot from the surrounding battlefields. Most of the bodies could not be identified and are marked as 'Known to God'. The Tyne Cot Memorial continues the list of names inscribed on the Ypres Menin Gate. War memorials in towns and villages around the country became the only permanent record to many families of their young war dead.

WW1 was meant to be 'The War to end all Wars' – how tragic that humanity does not learn that killing others is not the way to resolve conflict. So many young men enlisted into the ranks between 1914 -1918 searching for adventure and excitement – little did they know what awaited them in France and Belgium or that so few would return home unscathed.

On Remembrance Sunday, this special centenary year, 'We Will Remember Them'
