Lest we forget

500 years ago, on 31st October 1517, Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses (or issues) to the door of Wittenberg church in Germany. This action lit a flame of truth which was to spread across Europe and the world. THE REFORMATION HAD BEGUN.

While we in Scotland must give thanks for Luther's actions, we can never understate the influence he had on others and in particular Jean Calvin and Ulrich Zwingli internationally and on Hamilton, Wishart and John Knox here in Scotland. The establishment of the Scottish kirk and the Protestant faith shaped our nation, being a huge influence on society in general and in particular our worship, work ethic and education .

Today, the situation has changed dramatically. Churches that once were full are almost empty.

Kirk membership has fallen and attendance at worship even more.

Our faith is regularly criticised or ridiculed by our media and politicians.

We have clergy of our own denomination who worship at the altar of social acceptability and political correctness.

We have no one to blame but ourselves, we let this happen. Martin Luther gave us the true message of the gospel that salvation is in Christ alone, by grace alone, through faith alone made possible because Jesus died on the cross and rose again. The passage from Jeremiah 18 v 15 tells us "my people have forgotten me and deserted the ancient paths to walk in their own ways". How true.

I ask you all to note Luther's words " here I stand, I can do no other" and stand up for your reformed faith.

Defend it against its enemies, they are not hard to find.

Shoeboxes 25 years on !!

I was having a wonderful summer holiday in Croatia. By the fourth day I was tanning nicely so we rented bikes and took a beautiful cycle route along Rovinj's wooded and pebbly coastline. Disaster struck as the wheel jammed into the metal frame throwing me over the handlebars and breaking my clavicle.

Jan, our rep was just superb throughout our whole ordeal! He dropped everything and got me to hospital in Pula, he hurried things along, kept in regular contact and arranged for food to be in our room for our late return.

For the rest of the holiday he was so attentive and we got to know him quite well. He shared anecdotes from his childhood growing up in the Croatian warzone. Although Rovinj was not targeted as Dubrovnik was, he had stories of Serbian planes flying low overhead, mainly around meal times, causing families to panic and run for cover. He remembered travelling to a wedding in Zagreb and his mum telling him not to look out of the car window. He did. He saw the carnage of a village on fire and people running, distraught in the streets.

Jan was three then and received a shoebox at Christmas for the duration of the conflict. He loved them but had some advice for us: "Less toothpaste, more candy"! This was the first time I had cracked a smile since my mishap. When I got home, I sent a thank you tartan shoebox to Jan, It contained Edinburgh rock, shortbread, Mrs Tilly's tablet, whiskey, a loch ness monster and the smallest toothpaste ever! Jan collected it en route to his mother's. They shared the spoils and reminisced. His mum got his old shoeboxes from the loft and he found his pale blue toy car, which was never far from his side during the war years. One of the boxes contained the address of the sender. He planned to contact them to let them know just how much their caring meant to him.- Morag McIlwraith.
