#### "COMPASSION"

When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. (Mark 6:34)

Friends, world can be a difficult, dangerous and lonely place. It is comforting to believe in a God in Heaven who loves us and cares about us and has a plan for our lives.

When Jesus looked at the crowd who followed him and gathered around him, he weighed them his own. Jesus in his earthly ministry saw hunger in people's eyes. They were pitiful as a flock without a shepherd. He saw hunger in their eyes. Not a hunger for food, but a hunger for companionship, a hunger for community, a hunger for love, a hunger for God.

When he saw that hunger "he had compassion for them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd."

Folks, compassion literally means "to feel with." Jesus felt compassion for them because he had felt what they were feeling.

Compassion on people is the most important thing we can say about Jesus, and about God.

It has been a long time since I have seen this country and indeed the world, so depressed and sad and frightened and on edge about the future.

And into this bog of sadness and sorrow, we the church are called to imitate our Lord and find ways to break into the cycle of fear and violence

with words and acts of hope and assurance, words and acts of compassion and healing.

So, today I would like to say to you folks, that we are called to have compassion, to preach compassion, to teach compassion, and to live compassion.

In this chaotic and fearful world we are called to break whatever rules and taboos and culture barriers necessary to let the world know God is not harsh, that God is not punishing them for their sins. He is love. He is steadfast, everlasting, never-ending love and he has compassion for us and has brought us to the other end of this pandemic's tunnel and will lead us ahead. He reaches out to us in the midst of our fear of death with an offer of life - of life eternal.

He is opening up His arm to embrace you, to protect you and love you as He is a God of compassion. Just let God love you. And, then, open up your arms and show God's love to the world.

# **Emergency Food for People in Crisis**

The congregation of Haggs Church has been generously supporting the Falkirk Foodbank for a number of years now but recently, in some part due to the Covid pandemic, donations have tailed off. This is a pity as the good work of the Foodbank is even more important as more people struggle to feed their families due to the end of the furlough scheme and to increased unemployment.

The Falkirk Foodbank exists to provide emergency food to individuals and families who, quite simply, have nothing. They rely on the support of the general public, churches, groups and businesses in our community to donate foodstuffs. With these donations, boxes or packs are made up designed to feed people for about three days.

The Foodbank was formed by a group of churches as a Christian response to what was seen as a growing need in our community. It has brought together a range of churches but also groups and individuals of faith or no faith to help others in a very clear and practical way.

If you feel you can help with the valuable work of the Foodbank please bring your donation of food on any Sunday. This will be handled under Covid guidelines before being taken, by our volunteers, George and Isobel Hoggan to the Foodbank for distribution to local people in need.

Suggested items: Milk (*UHT or powdered*), Sugar (500g), Fruit Juice (carton or diluting), Pasta sauces, tinned Vegetables, Fruit, Meat and Fish Jam, Chocolate – small bar.

#### **HAGGS CHURCH AND COVID-19**

In March of last year life in Haggs Church was moving along as normal. We were fund raising to help pay the cost of the repair to the Church ceiling and were looking forward to a concert in the Hall from the Falkirk Bohemians. Services were taking place and organisations were meeting.

We were aware of this thing called Covid-19 but did not think that it would have much impact on us. How wrong we were. By the end of the month we had cancelled the concert and the Scottish Government placed the whole country in total lockdown in an attempt to control the spread of the virus. This meant the closure of both the Church and the Hall. It remained this way until September.

However, during this time we were not idle. Raheel saw to our spiritual needs through his weekly service streamed from the manse. Gardens were tended, grass was cut, property was maintained, forms were filled, risk assessments were completed (buildings fire & covid), weekly inspections were carried out, procedures were written (for cleaning and sanitising the Church, for entering and leaving the Church and for dealing with anyone who has Covid-19 or its symptoms), all to ensure that we would be ready to re-open when restrictions were finally lifted.

Permission to re-open finally came in September. We decided to re-open the Church only and leave the Hall to a later date. Social distancing was set to 2 metres, meaning that the Church, which normally could seat approximately 150 downstairs, was limited to 40 people. In addition, we had to phone on a Friday to reserve a seat and the Church had to be cleaned and sanitised between services. We extend our thanks to those who performed these important tasks.

At least we were back in Church and looking forward to Christmas. Unfortunately, things took a turn for the worst and tightened restrictions

meant that we were once again forced to close, putting us in a care and maintenance mode once again.

It stayed this way until March of this year when, after updating our procedures and risk assessments, we were once again allowed to reopen. We also re-introduced flowers to the Church, were allowed to use hymn books again and sing in the Church (as long as we wore our face protection).

At the time of writing this article, social distancing has been reduced to 1 metre, meaning that we can now seat 63 people and no longer need to phone on a Friday for a seat. Our hopes are that we can soon move to no distance restrictions, allowing us to move back to our full capacity. We are also planning to re-open the Hall for Teas and Coffees and organisation use.

Life has been difficult for us all since last March. We have all been touched by Covid-19 in different ways. Some have lost loved ones, some have caught the virus, some have been in shielding, some have been in self-isolation. We have been deprived the opportunity to say farewell to our friends and loved ones who succumbed to the virus and been unable to visit those who were in hospital or a Care Home.

Through all of this our faith has sustained us and we give thanks to God for the strength that we derive from Him, through that faith. We also give thanks to everyone who helped us, in many different ways, through this particularly difficult and challenging time in our Church life.

Haggs Church has survived and we look to the future with renewed strength and dedication.

#### **Conducting worship during Covid restrictions**

We in Haggs and in Denny Old churches have been blessed in our being able to access Raheel's Sunday morning worship on-line during Covid 19 restrictions. During lockdown when churches were closed, we shared morning worship from the manse with Raheel, Humaira and Roshan for which we are most grateful. Back in church, having the words and, in Haggs, the music of the hymns on screens is a boon, especially now that we can sing aloud, albeit with masks. The ability to request a hymnbook is positive too.

I am privileged to provide pulpit supply for Raheel but my experiences from taking services in another five churches during the Covid restrictions are varied. Initially, I found conducting a church service over the telephone rather strange, speaking into a void with no interaction. However, I came to enjoy telephone worship and visualised the congregation sitting in their church building.

Since church buildings have reopened, I have found Covid protection protocols to be well implemented in each of the four church buildings where I took services. Each congregation's experience differed though: only one congregation displayed the words of hymns, the others had to rely on their memories. One church relied on pre-recorded music but had no words. Three congregations had the benefit of an organist, but no words.

These experiences showed me that, despite adverse circumstances, Christian folk will continue to gather to worship God. I found that very humbling. God bless ministers and kirk sessions as they strive to make worship available to their congregations.

Jack was ordained as an elder at High Blantyre Church in 1973 and was admitted to Haggs Session in 1978. During his 43 years of dedicated service at Haggs he has held many offices; including Session Clerk, Property convenor, Health & Safety Officer and recently, as our Covid Coordinator, he has guided us through the maze of legal requirements that have enabled us to reopen the church safely.

Susan was also ordained as an elder in 1978, becoming the first female member of Haggs Kirk Session. She has dedicated her 43 years of service to inspiring young people in the church and local youth groups to reach their potential and become better citizens through her leadership of the Duke of Edinburgh award scheme, Scouts and St. Andrew's Brigade.
