On Sunday 4th October the congregations at Haggs and Denny Old Parish churches voted on the revised terms of linkage between our two churches. The totalled result from the two churches was a clear acceptance with 113 votes in favour and 2 against.

Subject to ratification by Church of Scotland authorities, our linkage is now established and this means that we can look forward to the next exciting chapter in our church life at Haggs as we work together with Denny Old. The first noticeable change will be the time of our morning services which from Sunday 11th October 2015 will be at 09.45 a.m. During the vacancy period until a new minister is appointed to the linked charge, worship will be led by our locum minister Rev. Sandra Mathers who will conduct services at Haggs and then later at Denny.

As we work together with Denny there will be challenges ahead. Our interim moderator Mr. David Nicholson will guide us through formal administrative matters but we, the membership, must be open and responsive to change and be prepared to play our part in developing a secure and happy future for both Haggs and Denny Old as we work together.

Camp 60 was situated almost as far north in relation to Great Britain as one could imagine, on the tiny island of Orkney. It housed Italian POW s where in their spare time away from the building work on the causeways that were named "The Churchill Barriers", they built their church, the one that we know as "The Italian Chapel".

Two Nissan huts placed end to end were erected and the men went to work creating their own place of worship. A new

commandant and a new priest had been appointed to the camp encouraging the men in this venture.

The Altar is a concrete block painted white. A painting behind it depicts Mary holding Jesus who has an olive leaf in his hand (the symbol of peace) surrounded by angels. The



picture was copied from a small one that one of the men carried with him through the war years. The entire building is painted and covered in beautiful pictures all done by one man, Domenico Chiocchetti.

The work on the chapel was done in the men's free time as they were there as prisoners, put to work building the barriers from giant concrete blocks, which would act as barriers creating a system of defences to keep "Scapa Flow "secure. Among the prisoners were electricians, blacksmiths, cement workers and of course a painter.

After the war the camp was abandoned apart from the chapel and the camp foundations as the prisoners were repatriated back to Italy. In 1958/1959 Domenico Chiocchetti, the artist had been traced in Italy and he was invited to return to Orkney to see his paintings. The chapel was restored by him and local volunteers and which remains for all to see after 70 years as a reminder of these men's strength of faith. "Where two or three are gathered in My name" comes to mind as I write this short story.

CHRISTIAN AID REFUGEE CRISIS APPEAL

The images of desperate refugees crossing the Mediterranean in unstable boats, or packed illegally into lorries, or protesting 'We are human beings too' in the port of Calais, are a distressing reminder of the shocking refugee crisis that led to the founding of Christian Aid 70 years ago in 1945. Christian Aid is working with churches and other agencies in supporting humanitarian efforts taking place in Europe and the Middle East. These agencies are working on the ground now providing essential humanitarian supplies such as food, cooking fuel, hygiene and sanitation kits, water containers and cash assistance, as well as psychological support for those suffering as a result of the conflict.

The numbers seeking refuge will grow as long as the conflicts in Syria and Iraq continue, and, as winter approaches in all countries of refuge, their needs will increase.

Although our morning service times have altered to the earlier time of 9.45am, we plan to still have our time for sharing food and fellowship regularly through the winter months following morning worship.
