

Thanks for the Harvest

Dear friends,

As I was thinking about what I might say in this article near the Harvest, I came across the following two quotes:

"I am wary of festivals. The reason: the horrors of harvest festivals. The idea behind the harvest I assume was to celebrate our bountiful harvest and help out people less fortunate than ourselves. Unfortunately, for those living in London suburb or any big cities means that there isn't all that much in the bountiful harvesting going on.

"At harvest we thank and praise God for all his gifts of food and weather, especially his plants which mature in autumn and nourish us all through out the year. And for all creatures which move in the waters, fly in the sky and live on the land. Harvest reminds us that all earth creatures are a community created to praise and glorify God. Nature matures in autumn even without human help. Wild creatures enjoy the fruits of the season. With human cooperation, however, nature glorifies God through cultivated fields, including grain and grapes which make bread and wine."

Two very different opinions, but what do you think?

The celebration of Harvest in Britain dates back to pre-Christian times when the success of the crop governed the lives of the people. Saxon farmers offered the first cut bundle of corn to one of their gods of fertility, in order to safeguard a good harvest the following year.

The last bundle was thought to contain the Spirit of the Corn, and its cutting was accompanied by the ritual sacrifice of an animal — often a hare caught hidden in the corn.

Later, a model hare, made from straw, was used to represent the continuity of the Spirit, which led to the making of plaited 'corn dollies', symbolising the goddess of the grain. These were hung from the rafter in farmhouses until the next year.

After Christianity arrived in Britain, some of the traditions continued in a different form. Ceremonies and rituals were held at the beginning and end of the harvest and church bells were rung on every day. The horse bringing the last cartload was decorated with garlands of flowers and colourful ribbons. When the harvest was in a magnificent, celebratory supper was held at the farmer's house, to which the whole community was invited and games were played to celebrate the end of the harvest.

I wasn't until 1843 that the now widespread practice of Harvest Festivals began, when Rev. Robert Hawker invited his parishioners to a special thanksgiving service at his church in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as 'We plough the fields and scatter' and 'Come ye thankful people, come' helped popularise the festival and spread the custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce.

Because of the climate in which Jesus lived, he would have celebrated two harvest festivals. The first, the Wheat Harvest, would have occurred in early summer at the time we now call Pentecost, the second, the feast of Tabernacles, as summer ended and autumn drew near. Just as we do now, it was a time to say 'Thank You' to God for a successful harvest. We don't need to live in an agricultural community to join in with this time of gratitude. However, we should remember to 'Thank' God for his wonderful blessings He has bestowed on us in creating us and all the beautiful creatures.

At this time we should also remember our brothers and sisters in our community who are less fortunate.

May you have a blessed time at harvest and share what God has given you with those less fortunate than ourselves. Amen

I have been fortunate enough to travel to various special places this year and to experience worship in a variety of Holy places: the quiet twice a day simple services at Iona Abbey, the splendor of the mighty Vatican City in Rome, the more subdued atmosphere in the Church of St Francis in Assisi and an uplifting Communion Service in St Magnus Cathedral, Orkney.

What struck me was how the faith of pilgrims had established these places of Christian worship often in remote and challenging environments. The enthusiasm and devotion of the pilgrims who followed in the footsteps of the founding Saints established Christianity as a faith that could be followed by so many people all over the world. To demonstrate the power of Christianity, immense and amazing Church buildings where then established by the followers of Christ.

Unfortunately, most of these places of worship are now visited more by tourists than by pilgrims and many of these Christian buildings rely on donations from visitors who come to look in awe at the art work and beauty of the buildings rather than for a religious experience. The maintenance and security of these Church buildings now rely on the income generated by visitors, as regular worshipping numbers are declining in Britain and Europe.

We as 'Pilgrims on a journey' here at Haggs and Denny Old Churches are working as 'companions on the road' with our shared Minister, shared services and activities.

We recognize the reduced numbers in both our ageing congregations and the need for reform and reorganization so we can 'help each other to walk the mile and share the load' to enable meaningful Christian worship to continue in our communities.

The journey is not going to be easy — with the planned Union between the two churches in 2025 meaning the closure of Haggs Parish Church, However, we have worked hard to establish the right to keep a Church of Scotland presence at Haggs by retaining our Church Hall for local worship and for community activities.

We will need to act the pilgrims of old with enthusiasm and dedication to ensure these changes happen and to make our church building welcoming centres of Christianity in our communities so we can also leave a legacy for future generations of pilgrims who will follow our journey.

Astri's Apple Cake

These cakes can also be used as a dessert, if you serve them with cream or custard.

2 medium sized apples (cooking apples are best but you can use eating apples).

150g or 3/5 x 250g block of butter

3/4 mug sugar

3 eggs

2 drops of vanilla essence (optional)

11/2 mugs self-raising flour.

3 tablespoons cold water.

Topping

1/4 mug sugar

1 teaspoon cinnamon



- 1. Preheat the over to 180 C fan oven/200 C/ Gas 6. Grease a baking tray and put a piece of greaseproof paper in the bottom of the tray.
- 2. Put the sugar and cinnamon in a mug and mix.
- 3. Peel the apples, cut into 1/4s, take out the core and slice each 1/4 lengthways again 3 or 4 times, making thin slivers of apple. Set aside.
- 4. Cream the butter and sugar together with a wooden spoon until the mixture becomes soft and lightens in colour. Add the eggs and beat well. Add the vanilla essence.
- Fold in the flour with a metal spoon. Do not beat. Add the water and stir gently. The mixture should still be quite stiff.
- 6. Turn into the baking tray and spread out evenly. Push the apple slices into the mix, distributing them as evenly as possible. Sprinkle the sugar and cinnamon evenly over the top.
- 7. Bake in the oven for 25 minutes. The top should be nicely brown.
- 8. Leave to cool and cut into clices

Gift Aid It



What is Gift Aid?

This is a government scheme which allows the congregation (as a registered charity) to reclaim the tax **you** have already paid on the money you give in your offering.

How does the church benefit?

While the basic rate of Income Tax is 20%, the congregation can recover the tax at the rate of 25%- e.g. £4 becomes £5

£20 becomes £25

£40 becomes £50

Who can give through Gift Aid?

Anyone who pays **Income Tax** or Capital Gains Tax which is annually at least equal to the tax which the congregation and other charities to which you make Gift Aid donations will reclaim on your gifts for that year.

What is Required?

Sign a Gift Aid Declaration- this is printed in the church magazine-ready for you to complete. Hand this to your elder or anyone on door duty on a Sunday or you can call Jean Duff, Gift Aid Convenor, on 01324 824768 and she will come and collect the completed form.

Give your offering using Offering Envelopes or by Bank Standing Order or by Cheque - to provide the Church with the necessary records of your giving.

You Do Not Need:

- To Promise to give a particular amount
- To promise to give for a specific period

Boost your donation by 25p of Giff Aid for every £1 you donate. Gift Aid is reclaimed from the government by charities from the tax you pay for the relevant tax year. In order to Gift Aid your donations, please complete the form and hand it to your treasurer.

"Will your anchor hold", the Boys Brigade hymn was written by Priscilla Jane Owens (1829-1907) who also wrote "We have heard a joyful sound, Jesus saves" and many others.

She was born in America to Welsh and Scottish parents, a Sunday school teacher who wrote many of her hymns for children.

Nearer home the Rev Andrew J Scobie (1935 -2010) wrote "Look forward in faith"

He was minister of Cardross Church near Helensburgh.

"The day thou gavest Lord has ended" was written by John Ellerton (1820-1893) and is one of my favourite hymns

hymn writer and preacher.

"The King of Love, my shepherd is" Is based on the 23rd psalm.
Written by Henry Williams Baker (1821-1877)
Son of a vice admiral, a writer of many hymns and a clergyman.

"The day you gave us, Lord has ended, the darkness falls at your behest",

Written by John Ellerton (1826-1893) A parish priest and prolific hymn writer

"Eternal Father, strong to save"
The sailors hymn was written by William Whiting(1825-1878)

The Driving Force



The Driving Force is a charity which takes anyone who has cancer and is registered with a GP in Bonnybridge, Banknock or Denny to hospital appointments for free.

Local volunteers work together to fundraise, co-ordinate and drive cancer patients to and from hospital appointments and treatment sessions. Kidney dialysis patients also benefit from this service.

There are 3 types of volunteers: drivers, co-ordinators and fundraisers. Drivers can volunteer to give as much time as they wish. While some drivers offer their services 5 days a week, Monday to Friday, many offer to drive 2 days or some 1 day.

Co-ordinators volunteer on a rota system and arrange a driver for each patient's journey and contact the patient with their driver's details. They contact the GP surgery daily to pick up the messages left by the patients. Fundraisers are very important to help with the prize bingo and coffee morning etc.

Haggs Church supports the Driving Force regularly with proceeds of Soup and Sandwich lunches etc being donated to the charity. Three members of our congregation volunteer as driver's and 1 volunteer as a co-ordinator. If you, or someone you know require the services of the Driving Force, please contact your GP surgery and leave your name and phone number and the on-call co-ordinator will contact you for your requirements. The Facebook page, The Driving Force, is a good way to find out more about the charity.

Sunday Club (Denny Old)


"Way, way back many centuries ago, not long after the Bible began.."

she stood up and pointed to her arm, where her sweatshirt was and said "that is a sleeve"


so we explained to everyone what a slave was, and that it wasn;t just in Egypt, that Scotland had slaves too.
