Fasting: "Jesus answered, "Do you expect the guests at a wedding party to be sad as long as the bridegroom is with them? Of course not! But the day will come when the bridegroom will be taken away from them, and then they will fast." Matthew 9:15

As we know that the season of Lent has begun on Ash Wednesday, 17th February, I want to focus on Lent which is a time for us to review our celebration of Lent and Easter. Folks, Lent is associated with fasting, self – deprivation, self – punishment and self- discipline.

Jesus' disciples did not observe official religious fasting. When Pharisees asked Jesus why your disciples do not fast at all? Jesus' response was *"As long as the bridegroom is with, they don't need to fast, but the day will come when they will fast."*

As we are aware that the period of fasting or Lent leading up to Easter in our Christian Calendar is associated with Jesus' fasting in the wilderness in preparation for his mission, however, the whole of his earthly life led up to and was fulfilled in his death and resurrection.

We cannot go through what Jesus went through. What we can do is take the signals for true living which he gave in his earthly life and be instructed by them for our own growth in faith.

The bridegroom (Jesus) is with us as a living presence as we move through Lent and beyond! It is presence of the bridegroom that we prepare to understand more deeply and assimilate into our own lives the character of his earthly life and the empowering he is willing to provide for our growth in the kind of faith he displayed.

So, my dear brothers and sisters, Jesus empowers us to observe Lent in whatever capacity or way we can. It is now up to us to decide what we can do during this Lent in our response to the bridegroom's call to us. Present circumstances and global pandemic have made us think to look around ourselves to the needs of the people in our neighbourhood and in our community. Whatever you have decided to do in the Lent, remember the people around you and help them. That is one of the purposes of the Lent along with spiritual overhauling.

So, my dear brothers and sisters spend more time in prayer, reading the scriptures and reflecting on them and make yourselves ready for the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ on Easter morning, not just as a remembrance and celebration, but also truly accepting and welcoming Jesus into our lives to receive an abundant life on this earth and an eternal life later.

Activity to do with Children on Easter: Fill the Egg

You will need: a large chocolate egg and lots of smaller chocolates and sweets (such as Buttons, Milky Way Stars, Rolos, Munchies, Maltesers, fun size chocolates, Skittles, Starburst), sharp knife, and tray.

BUILDING BACK BETTER

Dear Friends,

I am writing this as the new Session Clerk for Haggs Parish Church following the retirement of Murray McCheyne at the end of last year, due to his deteriorating health.

We are all grieving for the sad loss of Murray, along with the loss of others from our Haggs Church family over the past year. It has been so tough for us all watching on TV the numbers of daily deaths, due to Covid-19, rising so sharply. It has also been incredibly difficult for us not to be able to visit and comfort friends in our community who have suffered illness or bereavement, or to attend funeral services for those who have passed away.

We have also had to get used to worshipping in different ways; either on Facebook, on the telephone or by tuning into radio or television services. Even when we managed to get back to live communal worship in our church for a few months at the end of 2020 it was socially distanced, with limited numbers, wearing face coverings and with no singing or friendly hugs.

However, it has made me realize that the structures and traditions of the church do not need to be limiting. We can still experience the joy of shared worship and Christian fellowship when worshipping in different ways. More flexible services, streamed music, increased contributions via standing orders, less formal communion and increased collaboration between churches may be the way forward in the future.

The current crisis has revealed the problems already present in our church and society and has amplified them. We should not just be looking to getting back to how things were before the Pandemic; we should be looking to improve the positive impact of our church in our community and in the wider world and 'Build Back Better'. Concentrating our energies on building relationships is more important than church buildings. Our church should be a 'Community of love'; Jesus died for the world, not for the church. Sending out love to our neighbours; near and far, through the love of God, should be our vision and mission.

God Bless you all and I look forward to meeting you again soon, hopefully in person.
