Vine Trust Take to the Water

When the Vine Trust, known for their pioneering work on the Amazon, were looking for somewhere to set up their new headquarters, it seemed logical that they were drawn towards water closer to home. So in September, they 'launched' their own barge, the 'Tom Dunn' and began using it not just as offices, but as the 'first centre of global citizenship' for the use of all. The converted oil barge has been gutted and converted into offices, a galley, classrooms with interactive whiteboard technology and even a stage, exhibition centre and reception area. The vessel is named after Tom Dunn, a senior naval architect who worked with the Vine Trust to re-design and re-equip their Amazon medical ships. He helped the Trust select the barge, did the design work on it and oversaw most of the work, but sadly died earlier this year before he could see it completed.

The barge will be docked in Leith in Edinburgh, just along from the royal yacht Britannia. Staff moved in during July and it will be officially opened by the charity's patron, Princess Anne, this month.

Willie MacPherson, chief executive of the vine Trust, said that the barge had cost just of £600,000, but that the overseas work of the Trust had not been affected.

"People have donated money specifically for the barge", he said. "None of the money has come from funds we would use to do the work out in South America.

"The conversion work has been carried out at Imperial Dock in Leith and we've kept costs down by doing the bulk of the work ourselves, with the help of skilled specialists who have come in to work with us."

Vine Trust is an international; interdenominational charity which seeks to enable volunteers to make a real and significant difference to some of the poorest children and communities in the world. Its Amazon Hope Project provides a health service for around 100,000 patients every year.
