It has been a real joy to share worship with you these last weeks and to begin to get to know you, and it's great to have the opportunity to send all of you – those I've got to know and those I've still to make acquaintance with - Christmas wishes in your magazine.

Next Sunday -29 November - will be the first Sunday in Advent and we'll be lighting the first of the Advent candles and singing the first verse of our Advent carol, and hopefully some of our young people will be there to light that first candle - and not just the first but subsequent candles too.

I heard about one young boy who was with his granny in church. He was one of those bright, inquisitive children who want to know about everything, and his granny was valiantly trying to explain things to him. One of the descriptions of Jesus that we find in the Gospels is Light. John says in chapter 1:4

As we look around our world today I'm sure we could be forgiven for saying – "It's not for the want of trying." Just days ago there were the horrifying occurrences in Paris, Lebanon, and Mali. Our hearts have gone out to those who've lost their loved ones, the many horrifically injured, not to mention the emergency services which have to deal with the casualties. It can seem as if all the powers of the world are trying to put out the light that Jesus brought. The NIV translation of John 1:4,5 says "but the darkness has not understood it." The Light looks like a threat – it frightens because it shows up the things we'd rather keep hidden. The world at large doesn't understand that the truth is different – it's the Light that brings life, freedom and an end to fear.

I pray that in the weeks that remain in the run up to Christmas you may know calm rather than the rush and bustle that Christmas can bring; that you may know peace of mind and heart as you meditate on the wonder of Christmas; that you may experience the joy of Christmas even in this world of uncertainty because your eyes are fixed on the Light, the Light that can never be overcome.

My husband joins me in wishing all of you a very blessed Christmas and a peaceful and happy New Year.

Journey to the 'Land of Happiness'

Recently I was fortunate enough to travel to Bhutan, a tiny country high in the Himalayas surrounded by India, Tibet and China, that is known as the 'Land of Happiness'. Bhutan only opened its borders to foreign tourists in the 1960's and joined the global community. Issues of sustainable development, education and health care, and environmental and cultural preservation are at the forefront of policy making by the Bhutanese government. The Buddhist religion is practised by 75% of the population and Buddhism forms the base of Bhutan's legal system and permeates everyday life. Bhutan is one of the few places on earth where compassion is favoured over capitalism and wellbeing is measured alongside productivity. This unique approach is summed up in the concept of Gross National Happiness being seen as more important than Gross National Wealth.

As a committed Christian, I had felt some apprehensions about being so immersed in the Buddhist faith prior to my visit to Bhutan. However, although Buddhism places a central role in the country it has not been made the official state religion. All Bhutanese citizens have freedom of religion and I discovered that, as a Christian, I would be made welcome in the country as long as I did not attempt to convert others to Christianity. I had the privilege, whilst on this trip, to visit many Buddhist temples, including one situated within the largest Buddha statue in the world – a magnificent golden image set high up on the hills which could be seen for miles around. I showed due respect by removing my shoes and hat before entering the temples and was invited to join services and blessings led by the monks. I did feel uncomfortable, however, participating in the prayers at the Buddhist altars and therefore I chose to say the Lord's Prayer quietly to myself. I also took with me a Gideon's Bible to enable me to read the daily message from God's Word to give me spiritual balance.

My journey to the beautiful country of Bhutan was therefore a physical, emotional and spiritual journey. The fluttering prayer flags and prayer wheels often powered by mountain streams in remote corners of the country reminded me that our faith is everywhere. Sometimes we need to take a break from the consumerism and rat-race that surrounds us to ponder on the wonders of the world God created and to feel thankful for all our blessings.
