THOUGHTS FROM YOUR FELLOW TRAVELLER

I take this opportunity to thank many of you – on behalf of Pat and myself - for flowers and cards received from many of you on the recent occasion of our 40th Wedding Anniversary. Your welcoming kindness to Pat and I has been very much appreciated. Thank you.

Around the time that you will be reading this, it will be over 100 years on from the ending of the First World War on 11 November 1918 and 11 November 2018 will have been marked by services at War Memorials, in Churches and at Civic events and we have done so with a service at Longcroft War Memorial and in our worship at Church. We were pleased to welcome representatives of BB, GB and Scouts at both these commemorations. Nothing of these celebrations were there to glorify war though we do give thanks for the courage of those who have fought in that war and in others for the sake of those who are vulnerable and exploited.

We may have different thoughts about Remembrance, some thinking it is time to forgive and forget; others thinking that only by remembering do we stand any chance of avoiding the carnage that is the truth of that war. So how do we remember? Let me suggest that we might have used the time of the two minute silence in two ways. In the first minute to think back and give thanks for bravery and courage and remember all who lost loved ones, whose lives were never the same afterwards. In the second minute, we might have looked forward in hope that we can learn to live in peace in a world which has respect and justice for all; that the destruction and pain of war will be over.

And for us as Christians perhaps we need only look forward a few weeks to the day that we celebrate the birth of the Prince of Peace into our world — the day that we know as CHRISTmas. Let us look forward to the renewal of our understanding of the first and still the best Christmas gift, the giving of God in human form in that child in the manger.

This Christmas, let's try to invite as many as we can to the greatest Birthday party that we can celebrate. As there will not be a further magazine before Christmas I take this opportunity to wish you a very blessed, peaceful and joyful Christmas.

MOVING FORWARD TOWARDS A UNITARY CONSTITUTION

As you will know at present the church is managed by two different bodies — the Congregational Board and the Kirk Session. The Board deals more with the practical management of the church buildings, maintenance and fundraising activities. The Kirk Session deals more with the spiritual aspects of supporting worship, services and church organisations and activities.

All of the members of the Kirk Session are also on the Board, although some Board members are not Elders. At present two separate meetings are held – one for the Board followed by one for the Kirk session and there is often an overlap in the matters to be dealt with at the two meetings. The number and duration of these meetings puts a burden of time on all the office bearers and also on any new minister that will come to our church in the future.

The Kirk Session is therefore planning, with support from the Church of Scotland, to merge the two bodies into one through a Unitary Constitution. You will be given more information about this proposal early in 2019 and the congregation will be given the opportunity to express their views. A vote on whether or not to adopt a Unitary Constitution at Haggs Church will be intimated, and then taken by the whole congregation. Any changes to the constitution will then need to be ratified by Falkirk Presbytery and the legal department of the Church of Scotland.

We trust that you will engage in this process and express your views for the future management of Haggs Parish Church.
