Together We Make a Difference.

A gypsy child in Bulgaria has received the millionth shoebox from Blythswood Care's Shoebox Appeal.

Seven year old Maria was presented with the gift box after a concert in a rural village hall at week before Christmas last year.

Danny Muschate, Blythswood's head of fundraising, describing Maria as "overjoyed with everything".

"Maria is a bright girl but doesn't have much," he said. "She especially liked the colouring book and pens."

Maria's mother, Rosica, was pleased that her daughter received a matching scarf, hat and gloves, as she cannot afford to buy her winter clothes.

Rosica and her husband are both unemployed and neither can read or write. Their household income of less that ± 50 per month goes entirely on food for their family of four children.

Blythswood Care's 2008 Shoebox Appeal raised 132,000 gift boxes, brining the total since the appeal began in 1993 to 1,122,000. Boxes were sent to India and Sri Lanka as well as to Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Moldova, Romania, Serbia and Ukraine.

Moderator Memories

A former Kirk Moderator is one of the latest online entries to the Oxford Dictionary of National Biography, regarded as the greatest reference work on earth.

The Very Rev. James Whyte, who died in 2005, is one of a number of distinguished Scots to be added to the listing which is updated online three times a year.

The published Dictionary is now in 60 volumes and is contributed to by more than 13,000 authors all over the world.

Professor Whyte is remembered for the sermon he preached at the memorial service for the victims of the Lockerbie air disaster. His appeal against retaliation and violence "reverberated around the world and may have helped to inhibit hasty armed reactions" his entry states.

Following the Dunblane school tragedy, Professor Whyte, who was Moderator in 1988, was invited to preach at the memorial service in Dunblane Cathedral for the pupils and their teacher.

Geneva Celebrations

The Church of Scotland congregation in Geneva has found itself at the centre of global interest this summer as reformed churches around the world mark the 500th anniversary of John Calvin's birth.

As the English speaking church which still worships in the building that Calvin used, they helped to facilitate WARC Study Tour of 120 church leaders in May and a week long conference organised by "Calvin 500" from the United States in July.

The city itself has seen many activities as people gather both to celebrate and to re-evaluate the significance of Calvin's legacy.

Club's Gift to the Holy Land

A recent pilgrimage to the Holy Land took some strange luggage with it -60 Dundee United football jerseys!

The jerseys, donated by Dundee United (nicknamed "the Arabs") were bound for East Jerusalem YMCA to help with their youth development programme. Rev. Stan Brook, Callander, led a team of pilgrims from churches throughout Scotland earlier this year.

The General Secretary of the "Y" Andre Batarseh had spoken to them towards the end of last year, and the need for equipment for the youngsters was raised. Mr Brook contacted DUFC Director, Derek Robertson, who discovered jerseys left over from a promotion two years ago. They were handed over during a tour of the TMCA and so the East Jerusalem branch of the Dundee United Supporters Club was born.

Back to Church Sunday

In 2004 two people were having coffee and dreaming of what they would like to happen in church. The outcomes of this was a pilot project of 168 churches in the Manchester area taking part in the initial 'Back to Church Sunday' Campaign. (B2CS) 800 people came back to church on that Sunday.

By 2008, the campaign had grown and been endorsed at a national level by the main Christian denominations in Britain and all over the world. Last year 3000 churches in Britain took part and 37,000 people responded.

B2CS is founded on the principles of Christian welcome and our God-given gift of friendship. At its heart is the invitation to encourage people to reengage with God following the invitation of the disciples to 'come and see' Jesus.

In Scotland the campaign is being co-ordinated by Action of Churches Together in Scotland.

Responding to the call, congregations like Clarkston Parish Church, Airdrie have decided to make September 20th their Back to Church Sunday (the 27th is the national date but this is a bank holiday in Scotland). Following a very successful stewardship campaign last year focusing upon people's skills, the Kirk Session decided to make September 20 an opportunity for spiritual renewal to the regular church goer and those on the fringes of the church community. Session Clerk Margaret Paterson said: "We think it's important for us to use this opportunity to reconnect with those in the community, to let them know we are here and that God is part of their life"

Costa Church

Ever heard of a cafechurch? It's the church for people who don't go to church, and it could be coming to a coffee shop near your quite soon. Cid Latty is the network leader for cafechurch and is currently helping Scotland reap the same benefits that England has been enjoying for three years.

"Costa Coffee have given us permission to establish a church in every Costa in the UK. We currently have 44 in Britain with thee established in Scotland and another in the pipeline.

"The Scottish ones are based in Shawlands and Newtonmearns in Glasgow and another in Erskine. Edinburgh are hoping to set up one soon and are currently in talks with Starbucks to see if they will help."

New BB Director

A Church of Scotland Elder has been appointed as the new director of the Boys' Brigade in Scotland.

Bill Stevenson is a well known face in the BB and has served recently as Treasurer of the Edinburgh, Leith & District Battalion. He has held many other positions within the Brigade including being a company captain, battalion secretary and president, and was on the UK Executive in the 1980s.

Bill is 48 and lives in Stenton, East Lothian. For the past 20 years he has been a manager with a software house specialising in work with housing associations.

Bill said "I am delighted to take up this post and I look forward to working with all the members of the Brigade in Scotland over the next few years. It is important that we remind people that the Brigade is a major player in Scottish Youth Work. At the same time we need to recruit new members and grow some of our companies. We have a terrific base to build on and I am sure we will be able to do this and raise the Brigade's profile with key decision makers."
