#### Dear Friends

Already when driving I've spotted that some families are well ahead and have their Christmas trees lit and their houses decorated in readiness for what is generally described nowadays as "the festive season" This week I had a phone call from Falkirk Council informing me that while they had erected the tree that always stands in the grounds of Denny Old Church, they needed access to the church in order to be able to switch on the lights. Everywhere it seems everyone is gearing up for the big event, and let's face it, for most people – except perhaps shop assistants – it is a time of excitement and bonhomie.

Of course the children are looking forward to their visit to that VIP – the one dressed in a long red robe and sporting a bushy white beard – in order to whisper what they'd really REALLY like him to bring them on Christmas morning. Whether their parents are quite as charmed with their requests is another matter altogether.

But let's face it, most of us of whatever age, enjoy Christmas – the lights, the atmosphere of expectancy, the carols being played in many of our shops, the prospect of Christmas dinner, perhaps seeing friends and relatives we haven't met with in a long time – perhaps since last Christmas - the exciting looking parcels under the Christmas tree, parties – all come together to produce a lightness of heart and readiness to laughter that no other time of year seems able to produce.

And yet ...... for how many of our population not just in Scotland but in the West as a whole, that is the extent of their preoccupation with the 'festive season.' Sadly to the majority, Christmas is merely a time of jollity in December and a headache come January. Most have no conception of the true meaning of what is one of the most important dates in the Christian calendar. I heard once about a woman who was buying her Christmas cards. She picked up some and on examining them found that each card contained a scripture verse relating naturally to the Nativity. In disgust she flung them down, exclaiming – "They're getting religion into everything nowadays!"

I received a communication from the organisation Open Doors this morning. They work supporting Christians in other lands who don't have freedom to worship as we do, and in this issue it is drawing attention to the fact that Muslim background Christians can't celebrate Christmas freely either. This is especially difficult for children in Bangladesh who want to celebrate openly and can have the effect of making them resent their parents. To compensate, for the last couple of years Open Doors has organised a Christmas celebration earlier in December where children and their parents can feel the joy of Christmas. They enjoy Christmas songs, stories of Jesus' birth, drama, games and a grand feast of local food and a special cake. One of the participants expressed his happiness at being part of the festivities. "Through this event, I was able to understand the meaning of our Lord's birth. In fact, for the first time in our lives, we were able to celebrate Christmas."

How blessed we are in this land!

I hope and pray that all of you will have a very happy Christmas surrounded by your family and friends. I hope too that where we know of someone who will spend Christmas on their own, that they will be included in our celebrations – remember a crotchety exterior can hide a lonely interior! And even if they won't come to our home to join the festivities, a visit bearing a nice plateful of Christmas cheer could make all the difference to some lonely, forgotten person who often isn't used to kindness. My husband joins me in wishing all of you a very happy Christmas and a peaceful, blessed and healthy 2018.
